MORNING MEETING

01

After arriving and completing the start-of-the-day routines, kindergartners gather on the rug for Morning Meeting, a part of the Responsive Classroom model incorporated at Pardes. The Morning Meeting builds a strong sense of community and helps children to succeed academically, socially and emotionally. Students have the opportunity to share information about important events in their lives, participate in a brief activity, and interact with a short message that creates a focus for the day.





LITERACY

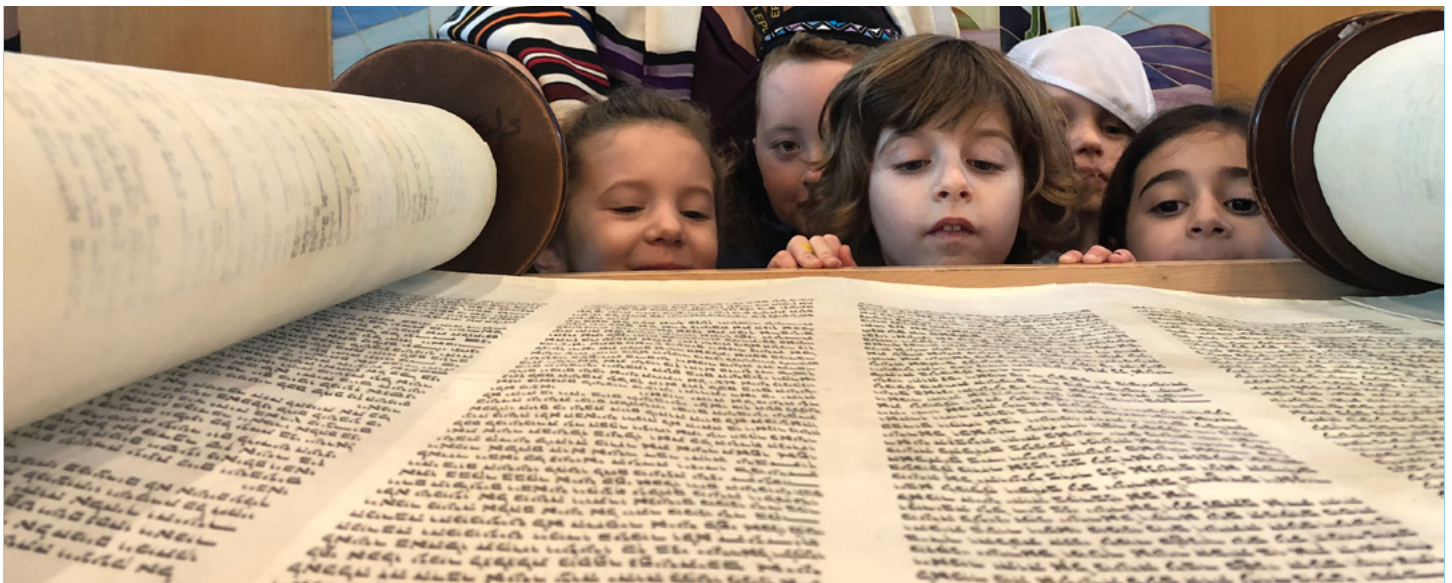

Children are engaged in Columbia University Teachers College Reading and Writing Workshop and Wilson Foundations®, which create a balanced literacy curriculum that helps grow avid and skilled readers, writers, and inquirers. It includes components such as phonics, shared reading, shared writing, interactive writing, read aloud with accountable talk, and small group work, in addition to mini lessons addressing foundational skills. Students explore both fiction and non-fiction units of study and are exposed to the writing process from drafting through publication.

Differentiated Learning

Each child is able to grow and reach their full potential in academic skills through differentiated instruction. All Pardes teachers are trained in differentiation methods and accelerate or remediate lessons to meet the needs of each student.





HEBREW AND JEWISH STUDIES

03

Songs, games, art, and other hands-on activities help students begin to practice listening and speaking in Hebrew. They also learn to recognize and write the letters of the aleph-bet and basic vocabulary. Common words and phrases are used throughout the day to reinforce what is taught in Hebrew class.

Throughout the week, kindergartners engage in Jewish life and studies — from learning about the Jewish calendar, celebrating the chagim (*holidays*) and learning the brachot (*blessings*), to building a love and connection to Israel. Learning what it means to be a mensch and how the stories of the Torah help shape who we are today are all a part of life at Pardes.

Students join the rest of the lower school for Tefillah (*prayer service*), Parsha (*weekly Torah study*), and Kabbalat Shabbat. Kindergartners enjoy sitting with their fourth grade buddies who guide them through the Siddur (*prayer book*).





STEAM

(SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING, ART, AND MATH)

Children are natural scientists with the capacity to observe, explore, and discover the world around them. The kindergarten model is characterized by the idea that weather, sunlight, and the needs of living things affect us daily.



Students practice making predictions, comparisons, solving problems, and evaluating their discoveries.



Each student has a chance to be Scientist of the Week, demonstrating a science experiment to the class.



Eighth grade science buddies engage our kindergartners in the excitement of chemistry and physics labs.

Makerspace: A Place for Creativity

Students gain a deeper grasp of concepts in the Pardes Makerspace. Some of the kindergarten activities include:

- Learning sequencing and pre-coding skills using BeeBots, a bee-shaped robot that follows basic directional commands, while locating Snap Words on a grid.
- Following NextGen Science Standards, kindergartners study “pushes” through domino chains and learn about “pulls” utilizing marble runs to demonstrate gravity and making pulleys. Students also design a small Rube Goldberg machine.
- Utilizing project-based learning, kindergartners make Havdalah candles and spice boxes in their Jewish Studies class Havdalah unit.



LUNCH

05

Children love eating lunch alongside their friends, and the kindergarten teachers are present to supervise and assist as needed. Lunchtime helps to reinforce what it means to be part of a community through learning how to use good manners, how to ask others for help, and how to work together to clean up. The kindergartners say blessings before and after meals.

Pardes respects and values the various approaches to the laws of Kashrut that exist within our school community. Our school observance is guided by the principle of institutional Kashrut and individual choice, which highlights the obligation to our families that each member of the community feels comfortable eating at our school. Students have the option to purchase a school lunch or bring a lunch from home. Our kosher kitchen is VAAD certified. All school lunches purchased through the school lunch program are kosher. If a child brings a lunch to school, it must not contain pork or shellfish products. No peanuts or tree nuts are allowed on campus, and our full-time school nurse monitors food allergies.





MATH

06

After a lunch break, students use real-life examples to build foundational math skills. The Everyday Mathematics program used at Pardes was created by the University of Chicago, and it includes concepts such as counting, numeration, measurement, geometry, patterns, sorting, and data-collecting with opportunities for differentiation.

Hands-on, sensory experiences help students regularly practice computational skills and learn multiple methods for problem-solving strategies. Research has shown this type of experiential foundation results in more success in written and symbolic mathematics in later grades.



Project-Based Learning Teaches Success Skills

Pardes uses project-based learning throughout all subjects and grades as a valuable vehicle to help students acquire deep content knowledge and develop success skills, such as critical thinking, communication, creativity, and collaboration.



PERFORMING & FINE ARTS

07

MUSIC AND THEATER CLASS — This weekly class introduces students to a variety of songs, instruments, and opportunities for performances, including two multi-grade-level (K -2) productions and an all-school Chanukah show.

ART — Kindergartners use the inspiration of different artists to examine all of the elements of art: line, shape, color, value, form, texture, and space. Weekly art classes also let children experiment with different materials, including paint, clay, watercolors, and oil pastels.





RECESS AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION

08

Kindergartners participate in physical education classes twice a week where they learn skills and enjoy playing games. A morning and lunch recess each day let kindergartners stretch, run, and play outdoors. In addition to play structures, they enjoy the basketball court and soccer field. During the lunch recess, our full-time school counselor leads board games and other activities for students who prefer a more structured time.



Social and Emotional Development

Pardes intentionally and explicitly teaches social and emotional regulation skills that are essential not just for school, but also life. These skills include social problem solving, empathy, self-awareness, personal boundaries, and independence. Social and emotional development is woven throughout the day, whether it is in recess or a formal activity with the school counselor in the kindergarten classroom.



CLOSING AND DISMISSAL

The school day ends with a Closing Circle, which is an approach to peacefully ending the day and sending students home with a feeling of accomplishment and belonging. Just as the Morning Meeting starts the day with a sense of calm, safety, and community, the Closing Circle routine enables students to reflect upon what is meaningful to them about their schoolwork, their classmates, and themselves. Students leave invigorated for the next school day.



Optional after-school enrichment activities are available for kindergarten students, as well as the opportunity to participate in Club J, which is held at the Jewish Community Center.



PREPARING YOUR CHILD FOR Success in Kindergarten



Read to Them Every Day

Don't rely on computer programs to teach your child to read. Make reading interactive, and remember it's not just limited to bedtime. Read the newspaper, articles on your smartphone, recipes, and signs in the grocery store. These are all opportunities to read out loud to your child.



Play Often

Playtime builds physical stamina and fosters the fine and gross motor skills needed for kindergarten success.



Provide Social Opportunities

Set up playdates or sign your child up for group activities. This helps children learn how to share, take turns, communicate their own feelings, and consider the feelings of others.



Give Tasks

Giving children responsibilities and holding them accountable prepares them for the structure of school. Let your young one set the table and clean themselves up after eating, pick up toys each day, and help you with laundry.



Practice Counting, Comparing, and Sorting

You'll build valuable math skills in your child when you ask him or her to count stairs, books on the shelf, or apples in the grocery store. Discuss the similarities and differences in the objects at hand. Find things to sort by color, size, or type, such as socks, boxes in the pantry, or utensils.



Talk About Kindergarten

Visit the school your child will attend before the first day, talk about the routines and activities they can expect, and let them know what a positive experience it will be.



WHY PARDES JEWISH DAY SCHOOL?

Jewish values, rituals, language, and culture are integrated throughout the school experience. Pardes is an inclusive community that celebrates the diversity of the Jewish people in a welcoming and accepting atmosphere. Students are engaged in Parshat Hashavuah (the weekly Torah portion) with community rabbis and speakers; a bi-weekly Lower School Kabbalat Shabbat; special holiday celebrations; and year-long Tikkun Olam projects that get students involved in social action.

A Caring, Joyful, and Dynamic Learning Environment



By challenging children academically while also caring for individual differences and the progress of each student, Pardes helps students develop a growth mindset that encourages risk-taking, critical thinking, problem-solving, creativity, and collaboration. The Pardes culture also nurtures a spirit of joy in learning, helping others, and practicing the Jewish faith.

Pardes families can work to offset as much tuition as possible through JTO Programs. The Arizona Private School Tuition Tax Credits allow state taxpayers to redirect a portion of their Arizona income taxes to organizations like the JTO.

APPLY FOR A NEEDS-BASED SCHOLARSHIP

Everyone should apply! Many applicants are surprised to learn that tuition assistance is available for a wide range of income levels. *An astounding 62% of current students received needs-based assistance this year, with an average package of \$10,000 per student.*

APPLY FOR A TAXPAYER-RECOMMENDED SCHOLARSHIP

Whether or not you receive needs-based funds from the JTO, you can still use taxpayer-recommended funds to help offset your out-of-pocket tuition expense.
